This last December, Dr. Jonathan Reed let us know he will be retiring as our Music Director at the end of the program year. Jonathan has been at The Peoples Church for 31 years, and we will miss him. On Sunday, May 12, we will celebrate Dr. Jonathan Reed's retirement with a special worship service and a big party after church. (More details will be coming in February.) The good news is that Jonathan recommended a talented in-coming doctoral candidate to be his replacement. We interviewed him, and he's wonderful! Michael Huey-Jones will begin his tenure at The Peoples Church in May.

There is one more change I want to mention - I am moving to an eleven-month schedule. I made a proposal to the Personnel Committee, that they reduce my salary by 13%, which would allow us to improve the compensation for other key staff people without dramatically increasing the overall Personnel budget. My goal is to keep our exceptional staff in place so we can maintain the momentum we've built up over the last couple of years. It just means I will be taking a month off in the summer, leaving Rev. Haley Hansen to run things in my absence.

As we contemplate the coming year, I hope you will join me in praying for God's guidance and wisdom. The Spirit is at work in this church and there is so much we can do if we follow the path God has set out for us! May your 2024 be blessed and bright!

PEOPLES CHURCH PRESCHOOL

The Preschool had a busy and successful year. In October a renewal of our National Association for the Education of Young Children (NAEYC) Accreditation was achieved through 2028. To prepare for the validation visit and inspection, the staff prepares program and classroom portfolios for nearly a year in preparation, every five years. The Preschool was originally nationally accredited in 1998.

Other accolades received in 2023 include winning the Best of the Best award in the Preschool category for preschools in the East Lansing area and winning Best of the Best in the Child Care category for the greater Lansing area for a second year in a row. The Preschool also received Nature Explore Recertification in September from the Natural Start Alliance for our 8th year. We were the third preschool in the state to achieve this certification, and are still one of a small group to achieve this distinction in Michigan.

Preschool had an increasing presence in Community Involvement and Advocacy. Some of these events involve hosting nursing students from Michigan State University and hosting and touring two groups of early



childhood educators from Taiwan. The World Wildlife Federation and Nottingham Nature Nook remain our favorite organizations to support. We were able to again raise \$500 through our annual Penny Drive to support local orphaned and injured animals at the Nook. In addition, the Preschool supports a yearly personal needs drive called Movers for Moms, organized by Two Men and a Truck.



The three Preschool Administrators attended a meeting regarding upcoming legislation for potential funding for child care centers and plans to remain involved as more opportunities present themselves. The Preschool worked with the Council for a Strong America and the media to host a group of speakers including Director Dana Johnson, Sheriff Wrigglesworth and other community activists in January. The purpose of the meeting was to advocate for high quality early childhood programs, fair compensation for child care professionals, and to highlight the need for federal funding for child care. The director now serves on the Capital Area Child Care Coalition to keep updated on early childhood developments and to participate in the creation of an apprenticeship program.

EARTH STEWARDSHIP COMMITTEE

Our church, under the leadership of the Earth Stewardship Committee, joined with other faith communities in the area to support the installation of rooftop solar panels on Lansing's first affordable allelectric solar home.

The solar project was completed and celebrated in June by members of the Capital Area Chapter of Michigan Interfaith Power and Light, which raised over \$20,000 to fund the cost of the 7 kw rooftop solar system. The potential purchaser of the home had to meet certain income eligibility requirements, and the house sold in November. The Peoples Church is one of about 15 houses of worship who are active with the CAC.



The project was coordinated by the Ingham County Land Bank, led by Executive Director Roxanne Case. Ms. Case appeared at one of our worship services and at a Sunday morning presentation to share more information about the solar home.

Members of our congregation also participated in several advocacy events at the state capitol in support of policies to address climate concerns in Michigan. Probably the most important new law that was passed empowers the state's Public Service Commission to consider additional "social justice concerns and impacts on energy sourcing and consumption" when reviewing rates and operational changes proposed by utilities.

Earth Stewardship has discussed plans for 2024 that are likely to include our continued engagement in community climate events and projects and maintaining our partnership with MIIPL's local chapter. We welcome others to join our leadership efforts to bring attention to the different ways we can care for God's creation within our congregation and community. 
Those who will be out of town, or are physically unable to attend this
