CHRISTMAS MIRACLES

In 1914, a Christmas miracle occurred. World War I (the "war to end all wars") had begun in July of that year, and all along the western front, soldiers were hunkered down for battle. In the week leading up to Christmas, men on both sides had been adorning their trenches with candles and improvised decorations. Groups of German, French and British troops shouted seasonal greetings to one another and sang carols in their native language. There were even instances of a few brave men crossing the battlefield to take gifts to the enemy. Then, on Christmas Eve, the men of the Western Front put the war on hold. Soldiers left their trenches to meet in the empty No Man's Land between the battle lines. They greeted one another, exchanged gifts of tobacco and chocolate, and even traded buttons from their own uniforms as souvenirs. They played football, sang carols and helped each side bury fallen comrades. The miracle of this unofficial truce lasted through Christmas day. There are some wonderful photographs of this event on-line.

The story of the Christmas truce was not reported in the newspapers of the time for fear it would undermine morale and weaken the public's commitment to the war effort. If enemy soldiers were seen getting along, people might question the need for war. As for the soldiers, there would never be another miracle. The next year, a few units arranged ceasefires at Christmas, but for most men, December 24th was just another day of war. This was due in part to strongly worded orders from the high commands of both sides prohibiting truces and discouraging "fraternization." By 1916, the human cost of war had become so dreadful that no one even considered a Christmas truce.

Fraternization is a funny word. In a military context, it means "to associate on close or familial terms with members of a hostile group." In other words, fraternization is when you treat an enemy like family. By that definition, it sounds a lot like the incarnation.

The miracle we celebrate at Christmas is the reality of God's love, a love so big that God enters into our world in human form. Pastor John Pavlovitz puts it perfectly: "Jesus didn't need to live here. He could have shown up, tossed out another stone slab or a rolled parchment filled with black-and-white religious do's and don'ts, and then disappeared into the ether – leaving a neat and tidy religion...Instead, he chose to live life alongside flawed human beings, in messy and meandering trips into wheat fields and lepers' homes and leaky boats." (Low, p. 11)

Jesus didn't need to live here, but he did. He came down, which is why we name him Emmanuel, God with us. In Jesus, God is with us, with us in times of war and times of sorrow, with us in times of sickness and times of struggle. God's light shines most brightly in dark moments...and there have been some dark days this last year.

I love the story of the Christmas truce because it reminds me that there is more that connects us than divides us. It also reminds me that the true spirit of Christmas is loving God more than we hate our enemies. The incarnation calls for fraternization. May the miracle of this season come to us all!

Perhaps Zoom "Peoples Pods" will be in our future for a bit.

It's a lovely feeling to see familiar eyes over the masks, and hear the voices of members I knew before. But it's also exciting to know there are so many new members to meet. I am thankful for the possibilities ahead.

Hello PCYG Students and Families!



DON'T FLUSH THOSE DRUGS!

a word from the Earth Stewardship Committee

Don't flush those expired or unwanted medications! Experts say proper disposal can prevent adverse effects on the environment resulting from flushing or throwing out medications. In fact, scientists in the United States and Europe studied surface water, groundwater and landfill leachate and found that medications persist in these liquids at very low levels.

The Michigan Department of Environment, Great Lakes, and Energy (EGLE) makes it simple to find household medication collection and disposal options with the interactive Household Drug Take Back Map, which is phone friendly, and its new companion "how to"

EGLE's Drug Takeback Map helps residents find convenient collection locations across the state. Instead of flushing or tossing medications in the trash, takeback programs provide a safe disposal option that eliminates potential risk of unintentional poisoning of children or pets and negative impact to the environment.



Most wastewater treatment plants and landfills are not equipped with technology to remove the chemicals in pharmaceuticals which often don't break down once in the environment. In a collection program, the drugs are incinerated under specific conditions that destroy active drug components. You can find more information at Michigan.gov/EGLEDrugDisposal.


SCHOLARSHIP RECIPIENTS
