REPAIR AND RESTORATION

"Whoever drinks the water I give them will never thirst. Indeed, the water I give you will become in you a fount of water springing up to eternal life." John 4:14

For anyone who has a subscription to Netflix, I highly recommend you watch "The Repair Shop." This BBC show is exactly what it sounds like: it's about a team of exceptional craftspeople who can fix anything. As the narrator says in the opening sequence, "they will resurrect, revive, and rejuvenate treasured possessions and irreplaceable pieces of family history, bringing both the objects and the memories that they hold back to life."

Every episode begins with people bringing in family heirlooms in need of repair: a damaged violin owned by a grandfather who survived Auschwitz, a cracked teapot that was a gift from a beloved great aunt, or a cherished 17th century painting punctured by young children playing with light sabers. The owner presents the broken treasure to the experts who always say, "Tell me about this piece." Stories come flooding out as people explain who gave them the object and what it meant when it was whole, how terrible they feel now that it's broken. Usually they want the item repaired so they can pass it on to the next generation. Then the owners walk out and leave the experts to work their magic.

It is pretty magical watching the restorers do their work. With precision and expertise, they take things apart in order to put them back together. They know what needs to be done: they clean and patch, mend and straighten, repair and paint. The point is not to make things look like new, but to bring them back to life. As soft toy restorer Amanda Middleditch puts it, "We don't want to erase all the signs of wear. That's how you know the toy is yours!"

I love watching the experts work, but my favorite part is not the repairs but the reveals—the moment when the restored object is reunited with its owner. Each person returns to the shop, anxious to see if the experts were able to fix their treasured possession. The item is always draped in cloth and then—pause for effect—the heirloom is revealed...restored to its former glory! People gasp in wonder. Tears are shed. Even the restorers get emotional. In one of my favorite episodes, a clock chimes for the first time in half a century and the owner whispers, "It's like my father is alive again." That is why I watch The Repair Shop.

Or maybe I watch The Repair Shop because it reminds of the Church. Think about it. We come in with our broken hearts, our wounded egos, our tangled allegiances. We are cracked and wobbly, rusty and worn, with some pieces missing. We remember a time when it wasn't like this, when there was music in our hearts, light in our eyes, hope in our souls. But no matter how hard we try to do our own repairs, it's not the same...we're not the same.

So we come to Church to meet the Creator, the One who knows what's wrong and how to fix it. We tell God how much it would mean to us if we could be made whole again, if somehow we could be put back in working condition...restored to life. Then we leave it to the Restorer to do his magic. And he does. He always does. No matter how broken we are, how flawed we have become, or how far we have wandered, Jesus puts us back together and makes us whole.

Do you know why we stand for the benediction? Because it is a tangible sign that we have been renewed, revived and restored. We entered The Repair Shop worse for wear. We leave with a spring in our step and light in our eyes, back on our feet. Thanks be to God!



CHICKEN AND HAM PASTA BAKE

INGREDIENTS:

8 oz. cooked pasta

1 cup diced ham

1 cup cooked diced chicken

2 cups fresh baby spinach leaves (tear into bite size pieces)

1 (15 oz.) jar of alfredo sauce

1/4 cup water

1 tbsp. mustard

2 cups Monterey Jack cheese (or your favorite cheese)

DIRECTIONS:

Heat oven to 350 degrees; spray a 13x9 inch glass baking dish with cooking spray

In a large bowl, mix all ingredients until well mixed; spoon evenly into baking dish; cover with foil

Bake 25 to 30 minutes or until heated through and cheese is melted; let stand, covered, for 5 minutes before serving

Serve with garlic bread; Enjoy!

THE POWER OF IMAGINATION



Some parents feel pressured that their children need to be 'productive'. That somehow being a good parent means providing constant opportunities, entertainment, and experiences in order to prepare children for the future. To the contrary, current developmental theory and research supports that children need down time. Our children need opportunities TO BE BORED, for just being, and simply PLAYING.

Skills, like the ability to think critically and solve problems creatively, are skills that can only be developed if a child has opportunities to build their imagination. These opportunities must be provided to children when they are very young. If we want to raise the next generation of thinkers, problem-solvers, entrepreneurs, and inventors, we need to foster our children's imagination and creativity.

As parents or educators, opportunities like these will inspire a child's imagination and creativity:



- Allow lots and lots of time for unstructured/undirected play
- Encourage art activities that nurture your child's creative expression (rather than following instructions for a specific outcome)
- Ask open-ended and thought-provoking questions, ("What do you think would happen if?")
- Engage in verbal activities—riddles, rhymes, silly games ("I spy")
- Tell stories to your child and have them tell you stories
- Limit screen time
- Don't buy plastic toys; a block of wood can be anything a child imagines it to be




READING NOOK
