ON MY MIND: THE BITTER AND THE SWEET

As you have done for the least of these, so you have done for me. (Matt 25:40)

I like a white Christmas as much as anyone, but the storm that hit last week was more than anyone had bargained for. My whole family was coming for Christmas and luckily everyone arrived in the nick of time, just before the storm struck. The weather went from picturesque to deadly in a matter of hours. While things never got really bad in East Lansing, I began to worry about friends and family who were still traveling. Then came the news about interstates snarled with accidents, people trapped in their cars, parents running out of baby formula. In Buffalo, NY, which has gotten over 50 inches of snow, power outages have been widespread and stores are running out of food. Worst of all, the death toll from the storm continues to climb. It's hard to believe something that is so beautiful can also wreak such havoc and cause so much damage.

Worried about the roads, my sister Kaia and her family left for home on Christmas Day. The snow had stopped but the temperature had plummeted into the single digits, which was a problem. The RV they had rented didn't have adequate heating and, once they were on the highway facing a stiff wind, the interior temperature of the vehicle dropped to 45 degrees. It was so cold, the toilet froze. Their two boys thought it was great fun, but my 82-year-old mother couldn't get warm, even wrapped in a sleeping bag. Three hours into the trip, it was clear they needed to stop, get some food and warm up. The problem? It was Christmas Day and everything was closed.

A Google search ("open restaurants near me") gave just one answer: a bar & grill just a few miles off the highway. They made their way to the place, which looked deserted. As they trudged in, cold and weary, the bartender said, "Sorry folks, the kitchen is closed." Close to despair, they decided to sit and have a drink and make a plan.

As they sat there talking about their options, they got into a conversation with the only other people in the bar, two middle-aged couples who lived in the area. They asked where Kaia was going on such a cold day with small children and an elderly woman in tow. My sister, who tells a great story, told them about the RV, the frozen toilet, and the need to find food. Their new friends suggested a good hotel and started calling around to see what restaurants might be open. One of the women said, "There's a great Chinese restaurant that's open but they don't have a website." So she called her son and had him take a picture of the menu on the fridge and send it to Kaia.

By the time Kaia and her family were ready to leave, they had a hotel reservation and a plan for dinner. When Kaia's husband went to settle the tab, he discovered their new friends has already paid the bill. "It felt like a Christmas miracle," Kaia remarked when she told me about it later. An awful trip became bearable through the kindness of strangers.

There are similar stories coming out of this storm of the century. Strangers are sharing baby formula, checking on neighbors, sharing shovels and buying groceries for people in need. I even heard a story about a man in New York who took in a bus full of South Korean tourists stranded near his home. In the midst of an awful time, little miracles seem to appear.

Perhaps this is a lesson for the New Year. I don't know what 2023 will bring. If the last three years are anything to go by, there will surely be good times as well as challenging times. What I do know is that when things go wrong or life seems bleak, small acts of kindness feel like miracles. May your small acts of kindness in the coming year be a source of miracles for others.

WHAT DOES IT MEAN TO BE A NATURE-BASED PRESCHOOL?

Even before I learned that Peoples Church Preschool could be 'officially" designated as a Nature-Based Preschool, I knew it always has been. Almost 30 years ago, when I began my position, Peoples Church Preschool had already been around for 43 years.

It was the early 90's and the early childhood curriculum I was taught in school was full of primary colors and plastic toys. This was also the way it was in the first preschool I directed for a couple years before coming to The Peoples Church. Having been nature oriented all my life, I knew that this program would be the perfect fit as soon as I arrived.

The existing teachers back then - Jan Calkins, Pam Mayle, and Judy Pfleger; under the direction of Yvonne Hafner, were ahead of their time. They regularly brought bouquets of 10-ft sunflowers and osage orange cross sections into the classroom, and had the children painting with Queen Anne's Lace.

Now, I have attended the Nature Preschool Institute, the Preschool has been a member of the Natural Start Alliance for many years, and we have had a certified Nature Explore Outdoor classroom since 2016.

While the Preschool has celebrated International Mud Day each June for many years, we joined the celebration of International Stone Play day in November for the first time last year. 
