On My Mind: False Gods

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A voice is heard in Ramah, lamentation and bitter weeping. Rachel is weeping for her children; she refuses to be comforted for her children, because they are no more. (Jeremiah 31:15)

As I write this, the country is reeling from yet another horrific school shooting. Nineteen children and two teachers were gunned down at Robb Elementary School in Uvalde, Texas. We have become so accustomed to mass shootings that the details of this one blur with those of others: Sandy Hook, Columbine, Red Lake, Virginia Tech, Buffalo.

Reading about the lives cut short, I am filled with many feelings. Rage, sorrow, horror, judgment, despair, helplessness. How is it that this country cannot seem to keep children safe? How can we call ourselves a free society when we are not free to assemble in safety? How can a country love its guns more than it loves its children? How did we get to such a place?

"Do not permit any of your children to be offered as a sacrifice to the false god Molech, for you must not bring shame on the name of your God. I am the Lord." Leviticus 18:21

In Hebrew scripture, Israel is warned not to worship idols or false gods. This was an important commandment because they were living amongst the Canaanites who worshiped Ba'al (referred to as Molech in scripture), a god whose worship included the sacrifice of children. It seems like an unspeakable practice to us, yet it was not uncommon in the ancient world. Over time, though, the kings of Israel forgot Yahweh's commandment. In order to curry the favor of the powerful Assyrians, both King Ahaz and King Manasseh are reported to have worshiped Molech (Ba'al) at the hilled site of Topheth, outside the walls of Jerusalem. But King Josiah, the reformer, put an end to this heinous practice, as reported in 2 Kings 23:10. *"And he (Josiah) defiled Topheth, which is in the valley of the sons of Hinnom, that no one might burn his son or his daughter as an offering to Molech."*

Do you see the connection? I will say it plainly: we are allowing our children to be sacrificed to a false god. The 2nd amendment to the constitution has become Ba'al, demanding the blood of the innocent. Many politicians on both sides of the aisle are behaving like Ahaz and Manasseh, appeasing the powers and principalities rather than protecting the people. When will there be a Josiah, someone who refuses to bow down to this monstrous beast?

Don't misunderstand me. I was raised in South Dakota where hunting is part of life. I grew up around people who owned guns and knew how to use them, but they did not worship them. That's the important distinction. I am a follower of Jesus Christ, who commanded us to love, to forgive, to serve and to worship only God. I worship the God whose kingdom is a place of peace, where "they shall beat their swords into plowshares, and their spears into pruning hooks; nation shall not lift up sword against nation, neither shall they learn war anymore." (Isaiah 2:4b) Our society has strayed far from the path of peace and prosperity, but we don't have to stay here. God can and *will* guide us forward.

It is time for us to end the worship of false gods.

The Benefits of Nature Play for Children in the First Five Years and Beyond

Nature play is when children are provided with opportunities to engage in unstructured play in outdoor settings. Natural elements such as logs, rocks, and water, are featured; as opposed to conventional play equipment like manufactured teeter totters and swings.

One of the reasons natural materials are so beneficial is because they allow open-ended outcomes for children's play. Play becomes less repetitive and children are able to build on their knowledge of themselves and their environment when they use a variety of materials each day. Children get endless opportunities to practice critical thinking skills like planning, construction, pretend play, and problem solving when there aren't limitations placed on materials.

Besides building their minds, exposure to nature also allows children to build empathy for creatures great and small, to appreciate the beauty of the world around them, and to make meaningful and relevant connections to conservation and sustainability efforts that can be learned at a very young age.

Children that play outdoors are able to take safe risks that build their self-confidence. Outdoor play provides great opportunities for large body movements, exercise, and most importantly contributes to reduced stress and enhances mood.





The Fine Arts Committee invites you to visit their latest exhibit, **"Your Art's Desire"**. The exhibit features the work of **Susan Smith**, a Michigan artist with an enthusiasm for color, watercolor and experimental media. The multi-media exhibit features 46 pieces from Susan's collection and includes watercolors, acrylics, reverse acrylic painting non lass, mixed-media collage, alcohol inks on Yupo and ceramic tiles, mosaic glass, and a phun phone. It is on display throughout the halls bordering the church Sanctuary and in the Thomsen case across from the Library. Additional pieces can be found in the kiosk adjacent to the Church Office.

Susan's work is sparked by a creative process that embraces a sense of fun, robust color, and beauty found in nature. She discovered her artistic talents later in life, when challenged by her husband, Doug, to decoratively paint one of his hand-built tables. She responded, "I can't do that, I can't even do stick figures!" His response: "So don't do stick figures." Susan found that applying vibrant colors to his table was exciting, even exhilarating. Inspired to learn more, she set out to build her artistic skills and subsequently spent 20 years taking art lessons and attending workshops, including a stint in Italy. She became hooked on the creative process and particularly enjoys trying new, innovative media. "I work in oils, acrylics, alcohol inks, art resins, watercolor and collage." In addition to painting, she enjoys working with mosaic glass, especially creating functional garden art.

Michigan's Bottle Recycling Law 40-year Anniversary

This year, the Michigan Recycling Coalition (MRC) is celebrating its 40th year of milestones. MRC is committed to fostering sustainability for businesses, the government, nonprofits, and individuals by advancing resource reuse and recovery.

In MRC's 40-year history, networks and partnerships have been built to collect and share recycling data, convened stakeholders to evaluate and advocate recycling policy, conducted research, promoted recycling and reuse solutions, and tackled problems in the recycling supply chain. MRC facilitates learning opportunities, shares information, tools, resources, and guidance to help local governments and businesses expand their resource recovery and meet sustainability goals. Managing our natural resources benefits the environment, the economy, and our communities.

Although many challenges remain, Michigan has come a long way since 1976, when the era of recycling started. Here are the highlights:

- 1976 Bottle Bill was approved by voters on November 2.
- 1978 Bottle deposit law was implemented December 3.
- 1982 Michigan Recycling Coalition was formed.
- 1988 Natural Resources Commission adopted the 1988 Solid Waste Policy and waste hierarchy.
- 1988 Voters approved a Quality of Life bond, \$150 million for public and private sector grants and loans to reduce solid waste disposal.
