




ON MY MIND

The first time I ever did "the wave" was in the old Metrodome stadium at a Minnesota Twins game. It was the summer of 1985 and my college boyfriend (a huge baseball fan) had agreed to take me to a game. During a slow inning, something started on the far side of the crowd. A rippling motion began to move across the stadium. As it moved, it grew larger as did the accompanying roar of the fans. It was The Wave. I watched as it drew closer and closer to where we were sitting, trying to anticipate exactly when it was my turn to jump up and throw my hands in the air and cheer. "Yeeeaaahhh!" How many times the wave circled the stadium that day, I could not say. I only know that it filled me with childlike joy! "Yeaaahhh!"





Yet someone has to start it. Some gutsy person has to stand up and begin the wave (Yeah!) hoping that others will join in. Someone has to turn and face the crowd and yell, "Go Green!" Someone has to go first... and trust that others will join them, magnifying the impact and making something amazing happen.

In 1907, a group of adult Sunday School students collected \$16.73 and gave it towards the building of a new church in East Lansing. Then came a gift in memory of Professor E. E. Bogue, that amounted to \$50. Gifts came in, piece by piece, and then in 1909, when the cornerstone of the new church was laid, they had collected \$17,079. And so began The Peoples Church!

October is our Stewardship campaign, when church leaders reach out to members and friends and ask you to make a gift of financial support for the 2024 budget. We use this money to keep the lights on, buy coffee for Sundays, tune the organ, pay the pastors, and wax the floors. We use this money to buy coats for children who live in poverty, stock the shelves of our local food pantry, and help a people in Maui dig out from the ashes. We use this money to support seminary students, feed our unhoused neighbors on a Wednesday night, and keep the playground neat and tidy. We express our faith in Jesus Christ by serving God in ways too numerous to count, and in doing so, we change the world! "Yeaaaaaahhhhh!"

The Peoples Church is like a Good News wave, growing and blessing and serving and celebrating! Every person is invited to participate, to share their particular gifts and be part of God's on-going work of reconciliation. I hope you'll join me in supporting this amazing community and ministry!

FROM OUR ASSOCIATE PASTOR

I've come to the conclusion that one of the greatest expressions of love is a home-cooked meal. Over the years, countless people have offered me a place at their dinner tables. I take home more than leftovers from these acts of hospitality; It's rare that I leave a shared meal without a story and a renewed sense of levity and hope.

I remember these meals often in my day-to-day life. I think of my best friend Marion whenever I make a lentil salad or scrambled eggs. On hot and humid days, I reminisce about the Vietnamese cold noodle salad I ate with my friend Jane and her family my final week in Boston. When I taste tomato soup, I fondly remember my church in Massachusetts. Every time I smell fresh-baked bread, I'm transported back to my elementary cafeteria, where the school cook served homemade bread with every lunch (small town South Dakota had a few perks).

To share a meal with someone is to take part in one of the most ancient and necessary acts of hospitality. Sharing a table with another person reminds us that eating is about more than fueling our bodies. We dine with one another because we each have an innate need to connect, share and give and receive care.

I've thought about my fondness for shared meals a great deal as I've planned our semester with our college students. Our campus ministry currently meets twice a week: after church on Sundays for lunch and Thursday nights for dinner and a rotation of programming. Whether we tuck into delivery pizza, sandwiches or one of Vince Watson's wonderful home-cooked creations, these meals offer comfort and consistency amid an everchanging student schedule.

We don't eat together because a student can't get a good meal at a dining hall. Rather, we eat together because our tradition tells us that we encounter Christ whenever we break bread with one another, whenever empty bellies are filled. We eat together because Christ embodied the Good News by sitting at dinner tables with all sorts of people. As New Testament scholar N. T. Wright puts it, "When Jesus himself wanted to explain to his disciples what his forthcoming death was all about, he didn't give them a theory, he gave them a meal."

We come to tables in search of nourishment for both our bodies and our spirits. My prayer is that these campus ministry meals offer students respite, growth and connection and remind them of the Good News of Jesus Christ. This church's continued support of campus ministry allows this ordinary act of grace to continue to occur each and every week. For that, I'm grateful.

FROM OUR PASTOR EMERITUS

The new banners hanging in our sanctuary are the result of a convergence of ideas. The initial inspiration for the origami crane chains came from a photo shared by a friend of a friend. While origami cranes have long been associated with hope and healing during difficult times, more recently they have become symbols of peace. The colored ribbons used in the banners are meant to play off the colors in our beautiful stained glass window. But it became evident that the primary colors of yellow, red, and blue serve to create the secondary colors of orange, purple, and green, our ribbon colors. Indeed, an infinite variety of colors can be created by mixing various combinations of the color wheel together.

The novel written by Eleanor Coerr, *Sadako and the Thousand Paper Cranes*, is based on the true story of a young Japanese girl diagnosed with leukemia as a result of the radiation from the atomic bomb dropped on Hiroshima. Sadako's friends tell her that a crane, the sacred bird of Japan, lives 100 years, and if a sick person folds 1,000 cranes they will become well. In the novel, Sadako does not reach her goal. But in real life, this young girl folded over 1,400 origami cranes before she died. The process of folding the cranes gave her hope.

I do not know how many members and friends of The Peoples Church participated in folding the cranes that went into the making of our new banners, nor can I adequately thank everyone who contributed to the process. But I can tell you that well over 1,400 cranes were created by willing hands — hands that fashioned these symbols of hope, healing, and peace. These symbolic cranes, hanging in unison with ribbons that signify unlimited potential for creativity and possibility, are the Worship Ministry's gift to the church. May these banners serve to uplift your spirits, give you hope, and bring you peace. Amen.






