It's only September and I'm already making plans for Christmas. I'm not talking about church, although we have already made many (MANY) plans through December. Instead, I'm looking forward to Christmas at my house because that is the next time all of my children will be under one roof. When all my children are together, talking and laughing and playing games, I feel whole.

Now I understand why my parents were always asking when I was coming home. *Will you be home for Thanksgiving? What about Christmas? How long can you stay? What are your plans for the summer?* As a young woman, I thought they were being clingy, but now I see... they just wanted to have the family back together... to feel whole again.

The Peoples Church family hasn't been whole since March of 2020. If I had known that the communion service on Sunday, March 1st, was the last time I would see people, I would have paid closer attention. I would have lingered over the elements, spent more time passing the peace, hugged more folks after worship. How could we have known?

Now, after 30 months, we are trying to pick up where we left off, keeping up with our vaccines, and making plans for post-pandemic life. We're bringing back events we haven't had in years. There's a Women's Retreat this month, and the annual Chicken Dinner on Kick-off Sunday. Once again, we will gather for dinner on Wednesday nights, but we're calling it Wednesdays @ Peoples Church. My Bible study will be back in the Robertson Room but we've moved it to Mondays at 9:00 a.m. The Sunday school is already making plans for an IN PERSON Christmas pageant! We're even bringing back the 8:30 a.m. Sunday chapel service. We have lots of plans.

The big question is: will the people return to Peoples Church?

Honestly, this question keeps me up at night. Though we have been fully open for months now, at best we have half the number of people who used to join us on Sundays. Yes, there is still a lot of uncertainty, but in a sanctuary the size of ours, social distancing is a breeze. Plus, we encourage folks to wear masks if they wish. So where is everyone?

I can think of many answers to this question. I've been told August is vacation time, so perhaps people are enjoying these last summer weekends before the Fall. Some people have moved to other towns, or even other states in the last 30 months. Some people have experienced a change in mobility and can't get to church on a Sunday. Others have gotten used to worshipping when it is convenient, watching the YouTube recording at a time that fits their schedule. There may even be people who simply enjoy watching the live stream in their PJs with a cup of coffee on a Sunday morning. These are all valid reasons not to be in church on a Sunday. I'm not trying to make anyone feel guilty; I completely understand.

I miss the cacophony of voices when we passed the peace in a large crowd. I miss the unexpected connections and new friendships that form when we are all in the same place. I miss you.

Our new church year begins Sunday, September 11th. There will be one service at 10:30 a.m. The choir will be in full voice, the Sunday school rooms will be decorated and prepared for children, and the tables in Snider Social Hall will be set and ready to welcome you.

I hope we can get the family back together again!

COUNCIL OF ELDERS

We Are Looking For New Members

The Peoples Church is looking for members who would like to serve as an Elder or a member of the Nominations Committee. Forms submitted by September 16, 2022 will be considered for a fall position.

The Council of Elders (3-year term)

The Council is responsible for the spiritual, physical, and overall welfare of the Church. The Council comprises 15 members, the Clerk, and the Treasurer, to be elected from the active membership of the Church at the annual Fall Election Meeting. In addition, there is one representative from each denomination. The typical meeting schedule includes a ministry meeting on the 2nd or 3rd Tuesday of each month and the Elders' meeting on the 4th Tuesday of each month. Usually, the Elders take a month off in the summer and do not meet in December. Ministry meetings can vary and be rescheduled as needed. Special meetings can be called by the Chair of Elders when needed. Elders are elected to serve a three-year term and serve two terms consecutively. New members take office on January 1st.

Nomination Committee (2-year term)

The Nomination Committee has eight members and typically meets annually in August to recruit and select candidates for Elders and the Nomination Committee slate for the congregation to vote on during the annual fall meeting. Members are selected to serve two-year terms and must take a year off before serving again on the committee.



EARTH STEWARDSHIP

Environmentally Friendly Tips

• It has been estimated that in the United Kingdom if each resident bent down ONCE a day to pick up a piece of litter, they would remove over 60 million pieces of rubbish from the streets and sidewalks every day. Just think what we could do in the United States!

 Modern washing machines, with modern washing powders, liquids, and tablets are just as effective at 50 to 60 degrees as they are at higher temperatures, so make sure you run your machine on low or an "eco" setting—and don't use the prewash cycle.

• To help reduce the need for harvesting more pulp wood, change your computer settings so that "duplex" is the default. If your printer doesn't print on both sides, save waste computer printing paper to use for drafts by printing on the other side.

• The comfort of our day-to-day life consumes vast amounts of electricity, and sometimes wastes vast amounts, as well. Given this, the ideal temperature for the inside of your refrigerator is 40 degrees. Similarly, the freezer should be set for 5 degrees. Any setting below these temperatures does NOT affect how well food keeps.

• Contrary to what is widely believed, lowering the temperature setting of heating does not cause extra consumption when the system is turned up again. For every degree you turn down your heat, you will save 5% on your heating bill.

• You can reduce your consumption of water by having taps fitted with aerators, which are quite cheap to purchase. The flow from the tap will feel stronger, but it actually contains less water and more air. Tap aerators can reduce the water usage from your taps by up to 70%.

• Since 1970, world production of goods and services has multiplied sevenfold. If you are weary of our over consuming society, don't miss the international "Buy Nothing Day" at the end of November (the last Saturday). It provides an opportunity to think about the social, economic, and ecological impact of global consumption.



CROP WALK 2022 October 9th

The CROP Hunger Walk is a nationwide movement sponsored by Church World Service to raise funds to end hunger and poverty in the U.S. and around the world. Hundreds of religious groups, businesses, schools and others organize local walk events in their communities each year. A portion of the proceeds benefit local hunger fighting agencies and the remainder is targeted to assist countries facing famine and food scarcity. The Peoples Church has a long history of participating in the Greater Lansing Area CROP Walk. This year the 5k (3.2 mile) walk will take place, rain or shine, on Sunday October 9th (time to be announced) starting at Grace United Methodist Church 1800 Boston Blvd, Lansing 48910. No bikes, scooters, or skateboards allowed. Wagons and strollers are okay. Please consider being a walker and asking friends and family for donations or donate to someone who is walking. Barbara Scott

On August 27, our beloved Rev. Barbara Scott died after a long and courageous battle with cancer. Shortly before her death, because of her declining health, Barb stepped down as the organizer and energetic leader of the Edgewood Village Partnership Design Team. In 2014, Barb and Charles Blackman, with support from the Community Engagement Ministry, committed to this partnership with the 135 unit low-income housing community in East Lansing in order to provide financial support, volunteer tutors, drivers, gardeners, and more. Hundreds of you, our church members and friends, have been involved in this ongoing partnership and continue to support this very important work. In tribute to Barbara's life and leadership, Design Team Members offer these comments:

From Val Nilson: Barbara was the epitome of love personified. She cared so deeply for others and put her love into action as she had done for so many years with the Edgewood Village project. Her passion for Edgewood was contagious, as she recruited many of us at Peoples Church to get involved. She sparked others to see the need and contribute in different ways. And as a follow up, Barbara never forgot to extol praise for the efforts of every single person. She was a rare and precious gem!

From Bob Steinkamp: One of my first memories of Barbara Scott was when she was looking for volunteers to work in the Edgewood Garden. I told her I would help. When I arrived, she was a force to be reckoned with, assigning duties and taking charge. I have always admired that about her.

From Kim Gools: Barbara was a dear friend to me for many years and such a special person. She tapped me early on to be a part of the Edgewood Design Team, and I'm so grateful to her for that. Through this connection, I've volunteered at Edgewood in many different capacities and found it to be one of the most rewarding things I've done. Barbara was a force of nature, for sure, as she was driven to make changes that better the world. She meant the world to me.

From Abby Barr: It's been a privilege to be in union with Barbara Scott, who is in union with God.

From Caroline Jacobs, Executive Director, Edgewood Village: What I will forever appreciate about Barbara Scott was her willingness to try. I think in the world we live in, it has become easy to feel overwhelmed and bleak. But Barbara always wanted to try. She was a never-ending well of energy and effort that I think many of us had drawn on when we were running dry. And as I am sure most know, she didn't just try. She succeeded. Many of the longest running programs at Edgewood have stayed feasible through her. The connection between Edgewood and the People's Church is robust and ongoing through her recruitment and support. Through Barbara, there are folks whose lives are tangibly better because she decided to try. May we all be willing to try a little more by her example.

From Mary Anne Larzelere: We are grateful for the gift that Barbara was to all of us. She enriched our lives with her work and her witness. She energized us to follow her example of discipleship, generosity and compassion. She modeled the joy of welcoming and loving our neighbors. How fortunate we are to be able to cherish memories of Barbara's abundant kindness and care that will forever be a blessing to our church and our community.
