On My Mind: The Gospel of Ted Lasso



There are many ways to mark time in the Covid Pandemic. You can do it in months of the year, in waves of infections, or in phases of public health recommendations. But I like to mark Covid time by TV shows.

I won't go into details. Maybe I'll put this in a blog post. But the list is telling: *The Tiger King* (Did Carol kill her husband??), *The Mary Tyler Moore Show* (Rest in peace, Ed Asner), *M*A*S*H* (I), *Sch***'s Creek* (Ew, David!), and *The Mandalorian* (This is the way). Each show was what I needed at a particular moment in Covid time.

Then came the summer and vaccines and the hope that we were finally going to put this virus behind us. Free at last! Free at last! Like so many others, I believed all would be well. I stopped watching television and started making plans for life PP (post-pandemic).

But it was an illusion. The politicization of the virus (and the vaccine) created a culture of fear and misinformation in this country. Then, as if to make a point, the virus morphed into the Delta variant, and suddenly we were right back to the spring of 2020, fighting over masks and social distancing. I fell into despair. What was the point of trying to do the right thing when so many people chose to do nothing? Cynicism crept into my soul and I had fleeting thoughts of re-watching *The Tiger King*.

Then I met Ted Lasso. *Ted Lasso* is a show on Apple+ and it is a revelation. The central story is a typical fish-out-of-water tale about an American football coach (Ted Lasso) who is hired to coach an English football (soccer) team. But it is so much more. Ted Lasso is tirelessly optimistic and positive. He believes there is good in all people and his hopefulness is contagious. In the face of disrespect, Coach Lasso offers kindness. When enemies attack him, Coach Lasso responds with grace. When others give up on themselves, Coach Lasso shows up with just the right response. "You beating yourself up is like Woody Allen playing the clarinet. I don't want to hear it." As one critic put it: *Ted Lasso* is about a good man doing good.

It took me a little time to get into the show. Lasso is such a positive character, such an upbeat person that I kept waiting for the other shoe to drop. Surely he would turn out to have ulterior motives, or it would all be just an act. But by the third episode, Ted had won me over...along with all the other skeptics.

I think Jesus had the same trouble: people could not believe he was as genuinely good as he appeared to be. They figured he would turn out to be like every other fake messiah - only out for his own benefit. If you read the Gospels in this way, each encounter with Jesus - from the first leper to the Roman soldier by the cross - is a chance to realize he really is as good as he appears to be. He came to bring us life - and bring it abundantly.

This is a good word in times of suffering, trials or temptations. This is a good word when we are sitting in a masked funk of disappointment and depression. This is a good word when we surrender to cynicism and think the world is going straight to hell. This is a good word when we're contemplating re-watching *The Tiger King*. (Don't do it!) Jesus shows up and cares for us in ways we can't even imagine. And once we accept that Jesus is the fullest revelation of God - and God really and truly loves us - then everything gets better.

Now if you decide you want to watch *Ted Lasso*, I should warn you: the language is very salty. But these days, Coach Lasso reminds me of what I want to be in the world - a good person doing good things. Thanks be to God.

1/2 cup sliced kalamata olives


3/4 cup feta crumbles
